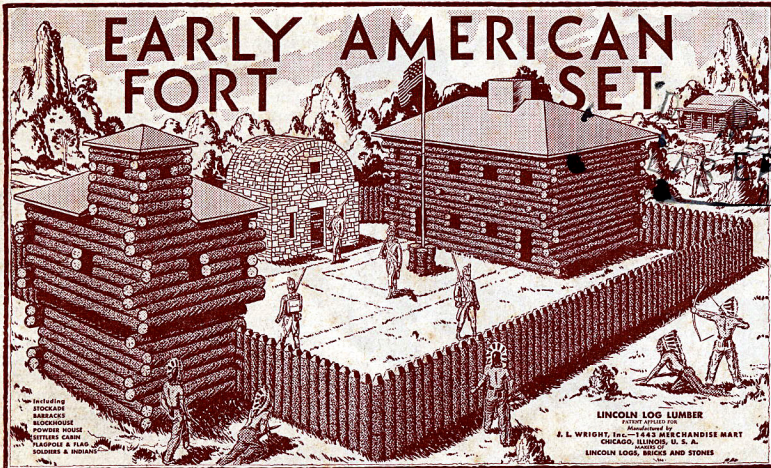

LINCOLN LOGS, BRICKS AND STONES

DURING the period following the Revolutionary War, a number of Log Forts were built by United States Army Engineers to protect the Early Settlers from unfriendly Indians and to hold the land against possible encroachments of Foreign Nations. These Forts were also used as Trading Posts. They follow the same general plan of construction that we have used in our Early American Fort Set which typifies the most important features of each. This set is made of Lincoln Log Lumber described on other side of this circular.

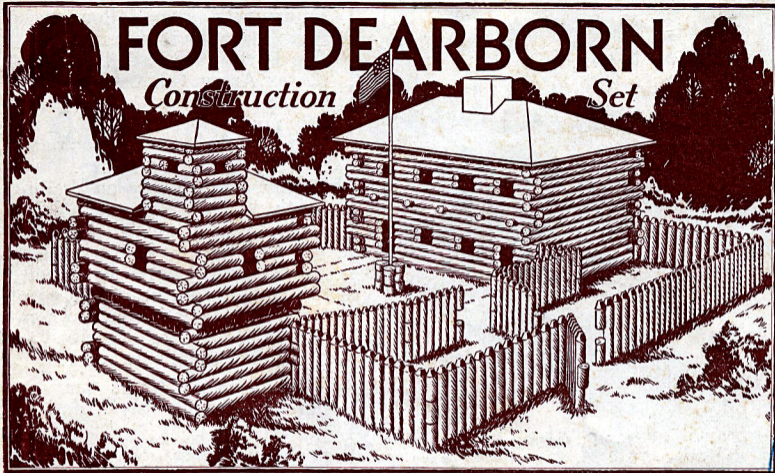

LINCOLN LOGS, BRICKS AND STONES

HISTORICAL

To the settlers of a century and a quarter ago, old Fort Dearborn with its Log Stockades, Blockhouses and Barracks was a refuge against the warlike Indians, it was a seat of government, it housed a church and it was the rendezvous for most of the social affairs.

The old Fort originally stood near the present intersection of North Michigan Avenue and Wacker Drive, Chicago. It was built in 1803-4. It was burned by the Indians on August 15, 1812, at the time of the Fort Dearborn Massacre. That event took place not far from the site of the new Fort Dearborn, which has been constructed on Leif Eriksen Drive at 26th Street for the 1933 "Century of Progress" exhibition at Chicago.

LINCOLN LOG LUMBER

The Lincoln Log Lumber used in the Fort Dearborn Construction Set has been designed to reproduce Blockhouses, Barracks, Stockades and Settlers' Cabins as truly as possible at a reasonable price. For ease in handling, the logs are made in groups instead of being cut separately.
